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


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FAIR RULES AND REGULATIONS

- **1.** Any person shall be entitled to compete for any and all premiums offered, except where otherwise specified.
- 2. For participation in the Woodstock Fair, all exhibitors must read and comply with all **Fair Rules and Regulations** in addition to **"Requirements for Entering"** listed within a given department.
- 3. All entries must be registered and postmarked no later than **Saturday, August 12, 2023**. No entries will be accepted if not registered, unless otherwise specified.
- **4.** A birth certificate or proof of age is required for all youth entering livestock departments.
- 5. No entry may be entered to compete for more than one premium unless otherwise specified.
- **6.** No entry except livestock, having once earned any premiums from the Society, may compete for same again.
- 7. All flowers, fruits, grain and vegetables must have been grown by the exhibitor. All animals and articles must be owned by the exhibitor at the time of the Fair.
- **8.** For department specific questions, contact the superintendents listed within that department.
- 9. Superintendents, at their sole discretion, have the right to accept or reject any and all entries within their department.

- **11.** To be eligible for judging, all registered entries must be brought to the fairgrounds on the proper receiving day/times. No exceptions.
- 12. Receiving Days:

- **13.** Entries are judged according to the American or Danish Systems of Judging, as specified in a given department or class. The American System, or Straight Judging, evaluates entries within a class compared to other entries within that class. Entries are placed 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc., relative to their merit. The Danish System evaluates entries based upon an established set of standards and judgments are awarded on the degree to which the standard has been met. Entries are not judged against one another.
- **14.** Decisions of the judges are final. Superintendents will distribute awards accordingly.
- **15.** Judges are requested to withhold or reduce premiums if entries have less than ordinary merit. In case of error in award by judges, a protest or appeal to be entertained must be lodged with the secretary at the time of the Fair and brought before the executive committee at its next meeting. Judging sheets may be inspected after 4:30 pm Monday.

- **16.** Anyone interfering by letter or otherwise, with the judges during their examinations, will be excluded from competition. At the judge's request, exhibitors are to make verbal or written statements about their contributions.
- 17. Any judge owning, or having an interest in any entry competing for award, becomes ineligible thereby to serve in the class concerned and is to withdraw. If for any reason it is improper for any judge to serve, the superintendent shall declare the place vacant and appoint a new judge. Superintendents will fill any vacancy in judges within their department, but not themselves act as judges therein.
- 18. Premiums will be paid from judging sheets and not from any ribbons that may be attached to the entry. Premiums will be paid by mail no later than September 30, 2023. Inquiries regarding premiums must be made prior to October 30, 2023. Checks for premiums must be cashed before December 31, 2023 or such premiums shall be considered as having been donated to the Society. No exceptions.
- **19.** All entries must be removed at the following designated times only, unless otherwise specified.

Monday, September 4, 2023 6:00 pm to 8:00 pm Tuesday, September 5, 2023 5:00 pm to 7:00 pm No vehicles will be permitted on the grounds prior to 9:00 pm Monday evening. Any entry not removed by 7:00 pm on Tuesday will become the property of the Woodstock Fair and will be disposed of accordingly.

Woodstock Fair Terms and Conditions

By purchasing or accepting a ticket to the Woodstock Fair you are agreeing to the following terms and conditions. Except for claims resulting solely from the negligent acts or omissions of the Woodstock Agricultural Society, Inc., the Society shall not be responsible for any loss, injury or death that may occur to animals, exhibits and/or property for any reason. Exhibitors, contestants, participants and/or the public agree to be solely responsible for any loss, injury to, damage done, occasioned by or arising from any exhibit, equipment, animal or person and shall defend and indemnify the Woodstock Agricultural Society, Inc., its agents and employees thereof against and from all claims and liability.

The Woodstock Agricultural Society, Inc. reserves the right to restrict, prohibit or eject any exhibitor, contestant and/or participant, which at the sole discretion of the Society, detracts from or interferes with the character of the Fair, or which may be objectionable or offensive, in management's sole discretion, to other exhibitors, contestants, and/or patrons. This shall include, but is not limited to, conduct of persons, signage or printed material on any of the grounds owned or controlled by the Society. In the event of ejection there shall be no refund of ticket admission price, entry fee or rental fee of any nature.

Use of the Woodstock Fair Name, Logo and Slogans

The use of the names "The Annual Woodstock Fair" and "The Woodstock Fair", the Woodstock Fair logo, or Woodstock Fair slogans, for any purpose or in any way, is strictly prohibited without a written agreement authorized by either the executive committee or the board of directors of the Woodstock Agricultural Society, Inc. and signed by the president of the Society. The Woodstock Agricultural Society, Inc. or the Woodstock Fair does not endorse any commercial product, service or enterprise and no officer, superintendent or director can, in carrying out their responsibilities, allow such an endorsement.

State of Connecticut Department of Agriculture 2023 Connecticut Fair and Show Requirements

A. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- Health certificates signed by an accredited veterinarian and other required testing will be valid for the entire 2023 show season. If travelling to multiple New England States for exhibition, see Memorandum - Livestock Health Certificates for the 2023 Show Season for additional requirements.
- 2. All animals and poultry entered at fairs and shows must be in good health and in proper physical condition and will be examined at the exhibition by the barn superintendent. Evidence of poor condition or infectious or contagious disease or failure to produce the necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in ejection. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture Livestock Inspector's decision is final.
- 3. Health charts and proof of vaccination where applicable are the responsibility of the exhibitor.
 4. Each barn superintendent will collect and hold the Health Certificates from each exhibitor. Animals not in compliance with state regulations for shows and fairs will not be allowed. A complete list, containing the name of the exhibitor, address, animal ID (ear tag, tattoo, leg band), breed and age of each animal and the total head count will be made available to the State Livestock Inspector and forwarded to the Connecticut Dept. of Agriculture, Bureau of Regulation & Inspection by the fair superintendent. All animals and poultry present on the grounds should be identified on this list. Any animal that is rejected should be noted as such with a brief statement of reason. Rejected animals or poultry should be removed from the grounds as soon as possible. Any concerns about the health of any animal or bird should be reported to the State Livestock Inspector or Fair Veterinarian immediately.
- 5. Isolate all exhibited animals and poultry upon their return to the farm from other animals and poultry for 3-4 weeks to reduce the risk of disease exposure and transmission. Call your local veterinarian if your animals or poultry become sick to help you with diagnosis and treatment.
- 6. Contact the Bureau of Regulation and Inspection @ 860-713-2504 with questions.

CONNECTICUT AND OUT OF STATE ANIMALS

All cattle, horses and sheep must have a rabies vaccination given by a licensed veterinarian. The vaccination certificate must be signed by the veterinarian that gave the vaccination and include the animal's identification and description, the name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number and the date the vaccination was given and when it expires. If it is the animal's first rabies vaccination, it must be given at least <u>30 days</u> prior to their first show date to be considered current.

B. CONNECTICUT ANIMALS

- ALL SPECIES: Animals must originate from herds or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut. State livestock inspectors may request proof of compliance with state requirements. No herd or flock under quarantine order shall move or be exhibited. All animals must have permanent ID (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, wing band or microchip plus a reader or EIA certificate).
- CATTLE: All cattle must have a health certificate issued within 60 days of their first show from an accredited veterinarian stating that the animal is in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases.
- 3. HORSES: All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months prior to their show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE & WNV within 6 months of their first show date.
- 4. SHEEP: All sheep must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks.
- 5. GOATS: All goats must have official USDA-approved identification and a health certificate issued within 60 days of their first show by an accredited veterinarian stating that the animals are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed herds.
- 6. SWINE: All swine must originate from Connecticut herds that are tested for Brucellosis and Pseudorabies on a yearly basis. All swine must have a health certificate issued within 60 days prior to the first show by an accredited veterinarian. If the swine are purchased from a tested herd, a bill of sale from the Connecticut producer must be presented to the State Veterinarian's office before a CT Exhibition Test card will be issued to the new owner.
- 7. POULTRY: Poultry originating within the state must come from healthy flocks with no evidence of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases. All birds must be inspected, identified and be accompanied by written proof (CT Flock Test card or CT Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab Report) that verifies that the breeding flock or the individual birds listed on the report were blood-test negative for *Salmonella pullorum* within 365 days of the show date. Concurrent Avian Influenza testing of the flock and/or individual birds is strongly recommended. Poultry vaccinated within 30 days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates or vehicles used for housing or transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. <u>Doves, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg band or wing tags.</u>
- 8. LLAMAS & ALPACAS: Llamas and alpacas that originate within the state must have a health certificate issued within 60 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchip) and stating that the animal is in good health and free of obvious signs of infectious disease.

C. OUT OF STATE ANIMALS

 ALL SPECIES: Animals shall originate from herds or flocks that meet the testing and health requirements of the State of Connecticut and must be accompanied by health certificates and test charts as indicated below. No animals from a herd or flock under quarantine order shall enter into the State. All animals and poultry must have official permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo, leg band, wing band, microchip and a reader or EIA certificate). All animals and birds (except horses) must have an exhibition permit number on the health certificates. Call 860-713-2504 or 860-713- 2508 for a permit number. All out of state animals and birds offered for sale must meet <u>Connecticut Importation Regulations</u>.

- 2. CATTLE: All cattle must have health certificates issued within 30 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian, test charts and vaccination certificates where applicable. All cattle must have a negative TB test within 12 months prior to show date. Cattle under 6 months of age may go on the dam's TB test chart if the dam was tested for TB within the past 12 months and a copy of the results is provided. All Brucellosis vaccinated female cattle over 18 months of age and all bulls and non-vaccinated female cattle 6 months of age and older must have a negative Brucellosis test within 12 months of the show date. Steers and spayed heifers are exempt from Brucellosis testing.
- 3. HOREES: All horses must have a health certificate issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. All horses must have a negative AGID (Coggins) or ELISA test for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) within 12 months of the show date and be accompanied by this certificate. It is highly recommended that horses be vaccinated against EEE & WNV within 6 months of their first show date.
- 4. SHEEP: All sheep must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by health certificates issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the sheep are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks.
- 5. GOATS: All goats must have official USDA-approved identification and be accompanied by a health certificate issued within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian stating that the goats are in good health and not showing signs of infectious, contagious and/or communicable diseases and are not from Scrapie-exposed flocks. All goats must originate from Brucellosis and TB free herds. Goats over 3 months old must test negative to TB and Brucellosis within 12 months of the show date. Kids under 3 months of age may go on the dam's test chart if the dam was tested within the past 12 months and a copy of the results is provided. Wethers are exempt from Brucellosis testing.
- 6. SWINE: Swine that are 3 months of age and older must be negative to Brucellosis and Pseudorabies tests and have a health certificate stating such within 30 days of their first show date by an accredited veterinarian. Barrows are exempt from Brucellosis testing but must have a negative Pseudorabies test. Swine under 3 months of age must originate from a Brucellosisfree and Pseudorabies qualified herd and the herd test dates and qualified herd numbers must be on the health certificate.
- 7. POULTRY: All poultry must be identified and test negative for *Salmonella pullorum* within 12 months of the show date and be accompanied by a certificate. All poultry must comply with the Department of Agriculture Avian Influenza requirements by originating from AI-Free flocks or be tested for AI within 30 days of entry and have a certificate. No poultry from areas of any state having Avian Influenza may enter CT. Poultry vaccinated within 30 days with any live virus vaccine will be prohibited from showing. All cages, crates and vehicles used for housing and transporting poultry must be cleaned and disinfected before and after each show. <u>Doves, pigeons and waterfowl are exempt from testing requirements, but must be identified by leg band or wing tags.</u>
- 8. LLAMA & ALPACAS: All llamas and alpacas must have a negative Axillary TB test within 12 months and a negative Brucellosis test within 12 months of entry, and a health certificate issued within 30 days of the first show by an accredited veterinarian listing the permanent identification (ear tag, tattoo or microchip and a reader must be available for the microchips) and test results.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

All animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine - cattle, horses, sheep, dogs, cats and ferrets - exposed to the public shall be vaccinated against Rabies. Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination shall be displayed in a manner such that the public would not be in contact or exposed to saliva from those animals and have <u>EASILY VISIBLE POSTED SIGNS OR RIBBONS</u> stating "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE - DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS"

On August 4, 2009, the Department of Agricultural adopted regulations for the "Control of Rabies in Public Settings" which will be enforced at Connecticut fairs and public exhibitions. Its provisions include the following for <u>both</u> Connecticut and out of state animals: 1. Animals for which there is a licensed Rabies vaccine

- Horses, cattle and sheep must be currently vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian unless they are under the minimum age to be vaccinated. (Ferrets are also included in this category if displayed.)
- These animals must have a rabies vaccination certificate signed by the licensed veterinarian administering the vaccine that includes the animal's identification and description, name and address of owner, name of the vaccine's manufacturer, serial number, date the vaccination was administered and date it expires.
- If it is the animal's first vaccination, it must be given at least <u>30 days</u> prior to the first show to be considered current.

2. Animals not having an approved Rabies vaccination

- Includes <u>animals for which there is not a licensed rabies vaccine and animals for which</u> there is a licensed rabies vaccine but are under the age to be vaccinated. (Most rabies vaccines are labeled to be administered when animals reach 3 months of age - young animals for exhibition should be vaccinated as soon as possible after 3 months of age.)
- Animals must be separated from the public by sufficient means to avoid direct contact with people and other animals, such as a double fence, plexiglass or other means or a conspicuous signs must be posted near the animal enclosure stating "CONNECTICUT RABIES ADVISORY NOTICE - DO NOT FEED OR TOUCH ANIMALS".

Special Notices:

Due to the continuing US outbreak of High Path Avian Influenza (HPAI), Animal Health Officials from all six New England States may recommend postponing competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps or other in-person events encouraging the gathering or commingling of domestic fowl or poultry. If events are held, best practices for biosecurity should be implemented.

Contact the state where animals will be exhibited for the latest updated information.

Currently an Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) is required for each state for every animal movement across state lines. Animals crossing state lines must be properly (officially) identified per federal and state Animal Disease Traceability (ADT) requirements. Each state to which an animal travels needs to be contacted to verify that all traceability and movement permit requirements are met before shipping.

Recognizing that during the agricultural and fair and show season exhibition animals may be moving to multiple states and locations within a state, the New England state veterinarians, working through the New England States Animal Agricultural Security Alliance (NESAASA), have developed a new protocol to facilitate animal movement. The New England State Veterinarians have agreed to allow a show/fair certificate to be valid for the show season provided that they are in compliance with all federal and state ADT rules.

One Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (CT,*ME, MA, **NH, RI and ***VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and location of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved. Note that *ME, **NH and ***VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these states are valid for a shorter period of time and may have additional language, movement and permit requirements. See details below.

- For the 2023 Show and Fair Season, livestock animals being exhibited in New England states must have official certificates of veterinary inspection (OCVIs) that meet the following requirements:
- <u>CT, MA, ME and RI</u>: OCVIs issued on or after **January 1, 2023** may be used for animals being shown at fairs and shows in CT, MA, ME and RI through the 2023 show/fair season ending October 31, 2023.
 - Special Note on The Big E, West Springfield, MA: All horses shown at The Big E Fairgrounds premises must have a CVI dated within the prior 30 days in 2023.
- <u>*CT and ME</u>: An importation permit for exhibition animals is also required. Contact CT Dept. Agriculture (860-713-2504) or contact ME State Veterinarian's Office (207-287-3701) for permits/questions.
- ******NH: Animals exhibited in NH must originate in a New England state and move on OCVIs issued on or after **April 1**, **2023** to participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 to October 31, 2023. Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603-271-2404) for details and permits.
- ***VT: The fair season is defined as May1 to October 31, 2023. Contact the VT Animal Health Office (802-828-2421) for specific import requirements and permits.
- A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited.
- Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one health certificate with appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different specifies
 may not be listed on the same official health certificate.
- An itinerary of the names and locations for each New England fair or show at which the owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.

 A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the official health certificate (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show.
 - o That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s).
- The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animals will be exhibited is to be used as the "destination" on the OCVI form. In addition, "See attached list" or a similar statement directing Animal Health Officials or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary much be included.
- Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were actually on the show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check-in.
- Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2023 for health reasons it must
 have a new health certificate issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.
- Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any
 time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

Remember: One certificate for shows in CT, MA, ME, NH, RI and VT. Contact each state for specific requirements. Import permits are issued by each individual state and must be listed on the OVCI. **The list of events, with dates and locations, where the animals are expected to be shown must accompany the OCVI.** Use one certificate per species. All animals must be listed individually, with appropriate official numbers and descriptions.

Sick animals may not be shipped anywhere.

Requirements for Entering:

- Exhibitors must read and comply with all Fair Rules and Regulations, 1. located on page 3, for participation in the Woodstock Fair.
- Exhibitors must read and comply with the Connecticut Fair and Show 2. Requirements located on page 4 and the Memorandum located on page 5, set forth by the State of Connecticut Department of Agriculture which will be strictly observed.
- Exhibitors are required to call or email the cattle superintendents to 3. reserve barn space for the number of animals registered. All class entries must be received by fair entry deadline or space will be forfeited. When the barn is full, the superintendents reserve the right to close entries.
- Registration and health papers will be verified by the cattle superintendents 4. upon arrival. Acceptance or rejection of cattle will be at the discretion of the superintendents and/or health officials.
- No animal can be shown as purebred unless it has been recorded in the 5. recognized book of record for its respective breed as purebred and have a matching readable tattoo. The superintendents will examine the certificates of registry at the time of arrival.
- Exhibitors are allowed a maximum of 12 animals per farm or family unit. 6. No more than two animals may be registered per lot.
- 7. Animal must be shown in its individual class before it can be shown in a group class.
- Youth exhibitors participating in both the open and youth shows must be in 8 control of their animal without assistance or risk forfeiting the premiums at the superintendents' discretion.
- 9 All exhibitors and their assistants are required to wear appropriate shirts and shoes at all times.
- Calves under 3 months of age and not vaccinated must have appropriate 10. identification and be listed on health papers.
- No horned cattle allowed to enter the Fair. No scurs over 1 1/2 inches long. 11.
- To be entered as a 4-H club, youth must have exhibited the animal at a 4-H 12. fair and have a record book for each animal. Each club may enter 2 animals per member up to 12 animals. For clubs with more than 6 members, animals are limited to 1 per member. 4-H lease papers and verification forms must be presented at check in.
- 13. Any cow that calves while at the fair, cow and calf must be removed from the fairgrounds immediately.
- Barns will be open Wednesday, Aug. 30 from 5 pm 9 pm for decorating 14. and set up only. Animals may be brought to the fairgrounds on Thursday, Aug. 31, between 12:00 pm - 8:00 pm. Once animals are on the fairgrounds they must be accompanied by a caretaker. All animals must be unloaded and on the fairgrounds by 11 am on Friday, Sept. 1. Entrance at the North Gate only.
- 15. Staggered release times for cattle on Saturday evening will begin after 6 pm as determined by the superintendents. Cattle releasing on Monday will be at 6 pm.
- 16. If for any reason the exhibitor cannot attend after registering, he/she is required to notify the cattle superintendents in order to be eligible for the following year's fair.
- 17. Straight judging in all classes.



- 12) Once cooled, cut into 9 equal pieces.
